



- Raymond Lee of Pest Dynamics not in favour of discussing those issues raised by him in this forum even though some of them were relevant.
- Winslow Wong briefed the members of the MPSJ meeting dated 23 Aug. '07 which were attended by PCAM Secretary, Exco Members: Winslow and Azlina.
- Mr Ng of NLC raised that there was no minutes documented from MPSJ pertaining to the meeting dated 23 Aug.07 and therefore the meeting with MPSJ was considered not official.
- Raymond Lee raised that PCAM did not make proper stand on the MPSJ issue. However, he did not register with MPSJ and some of his business opportunities were sacrificed.
- The President at this juncture, suggested to have a block registration on behalf of all our members and there should be no necessity of forms for application.

- 7. Legal Advisor, Mr Kenny Ng declared that there is no law to implement this ruling of registration and deposit by MPSJ. There is no locus standi for PCAM to pursue legal proceeding against MPSJ. However, he suggested that those affected should lobby with each other to create a case against MPSJ. He continued by saying that PCAM can take MPSJ to court as a declaration and let the court decide on it.
- Mr Yoong of AntiPest passionately pleaded to all those present to support their stand to PCAM Exco to pursue the struggle for the members as he said that all the members will in the long run suffered with this ruling.
- Mr Richard Ng of NLC suggested to all present to make a decision to give a mandate to PCAM to pursue the matter with MPSJ through legal means if MPSJ is still stubborn to implement such rulings on the Pest Control companies.
- A mandate was given to the PCAM Exco unanimously by the show of hands.

PERSPECTIVE IN TERMITE MANAGEMENT IN BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES IN MALAYSIA

Termites are a highly destructive group of insect pests in the urban environment. The damage they cause to buildings and structures was estimated at about US\$22 billion world-wide in the year 2000. Termite management constitutes a substantial proportion of the pest management industry business in Malaysia, Singapore and Thailand. Approximately RM50 million is being spent each year on termite management and it is generally believed that the total cost of repair for termite damages is about 3 to 4 times higher than the total cost for its management. Over the past several years, termite infestation has received relatively wide coverage in news reports in Malaysia, especially when heritage buildings, schools, army camps and human lives are involved.

From the ecological perspective, termites are considered as beneficial insects. They help to break down fallens trees, woods and other dying plant matters in the tropical rain forest. They also served as food source to other insects and animals, and playing an important role in nutrient recycling in the forest. In some parts of the world (eg. Australia Northern Territory), huge termite mounds can serve as tourist attraction. In South East Asia (eg. Malaysia and Singapore), the culture of worshipping termite mounds is common especially among some local communities. Those who worship termite mounds believe that they can bring wealth, luck or even realising a wish. Termites are also consumed as food. Some believe that consuming live termite queens can cure them of asthma and other lung-related diseases, in addition to serving as aphrodisiac!



Being located in the tropics, Malaysia is blessed with a rich termite diversity. A total of 175 species of Malaysian termites have been described. Among those species found in Malaysia, only three species are commonly known to attack buildings and structures in Malaysia. They are Coptotermes gestroi, Coptotermes curvignathus and Coptotermes kalshoveni. These three Coptotermes species are all cryptic species and do not build mounds. The mound-building species (eg. Macrotermes gilvus, Macrotermes carbonarius, Globitermes sulphureus are not those that normally attack buildings and structures in Malaysia. They only contribute to less than 10% of the total subterranean termite infestation. Other perimeter species that can be found in and around buildings and structures include Microtermes pakistanicus, Odontotermes spp, Microcerotermes spp, etc.

Having an accurate termite taxonomy is important in pest management. This will help to avoid duplicative testing of termite management strategies, and information generated from different countries may be applied or adapted by one another, thus saving time, resources and money. If there are taxonomic confusions, or having wrong name applied to a particular pest species, pest management decision may be made based on misleading or wrong information. Modern techniques such as the use of mitochondrial DNA genes have been popular and able to reveal relationship among populations and to differentiate species. With the combination of morphometric and molecular characters analysed under phenetic and cladistic assumptions, this has made inroads in our knowledge of termite taxonomy.

In most situations, termite infestation can be prevented or detected at an early stage. Based on surveys carried out in Malaysia on premises that were infested by termites, the door and window frames, wooden flooring and built-in cabinets were found to be most prone to termite infestation.

For the past a few decades, buildings and structures are protected by administering a chemical barrier between the building and the soil. This is done before any building or structure is constructed. The barrier treatment will protect the building from penetration by foraging termites through the soil by repelling the termites away.

More recently, there has been an increasing popularity in the use of non-repellent termiticides. This characteristic is unique because termites will not be able to detect the presence of the treated termiticide, and thus will continue to forage through the soil until the demise or suppression of the whole colony. These compounds have a delayed mode of action that allow termites to forage freely in and out of the treated zone, thus promising a greater impact to the whole colony.

For post-construction treatment, several methods can be engaged through a pest management company such as spot treatment, corrective soil treatment and baiting. Spot treatment, the least expensive one, is done by puffing an insecticidal dust into the mud tubes. However, this is a symptomatic treatment and often provides management for a short period of time.


Corrective soil treatment is conducted by pumping termiticides into drilled holes along the inner/outer perimeter of the house. The distance between two holes is an extremely crucial factor to ensure a continuous chemical barrier beneath the house upon application. If the distance between the holes is too wide apart, the gap will be present and this will allow subterranean termites to tunnel into the house. It is also important that the pest management company that is carrying out the treatment follows the recommended dosage of termiticide as suggested on the label.

Baiting is a passive management method which requires the termites to feed on baits containing insecticide (or insect growth regulator). The bait is normally consisted of cellulosic material (eg. paper, or cellulose powder) that has been impregnated with a toxicant. Upon feeding by the termites, the bait will subsequently be transferred to other colony members through a food-sharing behaviour called trophallaxis and will gradually cause the termite colony to be suppressed or eliminated.

Although baits may be found to be effective, it is important to note that they are only effective against lower termites from the genus of Coptotermes and Schedorhinotermes (family Rhinotermitidae). Higher termites from family Termitidae are normally not responsive to baits. This situation is not unique to Malaysia, but also to Thailand, Singapore, Indonesia and Australia. As there is a wider range of pest termite generally consisting of both lower and higher termites in Southeast Asia and Australasia, such situation may pose a challenge to pest management professionals because baiting only works against certain species. The complication is further aggravated when a structure is attacked simultaneously by more than one species, or in succession by different species upon the suppression or elimination of the first species by termite bait.

In the lecture, Professor Lee provided a comprehensive talk on the pest status of termites in Malaysia, the damages they cause to the urban structures, important biological and behavioral characteristics, detection methods and the various management strategies available. He also discussed the challenges faced by the pest management industry in relation to subterranean termite management in Malaysia, and future perspectives and opportunities.
